Goodbye Stoke Fleming, Blackawton & Strete from Rev'd John & Dr. Hazel Bell

I have just returned from Loddiswell and the Licensing Service, led by the Bishop of Exeter, of the Revd. Daniel Hartley, now Priest in Charge of the Aune Valley Mission Community (in our Woodleigh Deanery). While there, someone asked me if I remembered the day I was Instituted and Inducted as Rector to the Benefice of Stoke Fleming, Blackawton and Strete. Yes, of course, I did: it took place on Tuesday 23rd October 2001, at St. Peter's Church, at 7.30 p.m. From my filing cabinet I have just pulled out the old Order of Service used on that occasion, and I see that not one of my then clergy colleagues is still in a full-time post, including the officiating Bishop, John Garton!

Many of you will know that I am due to retire in June. During Hazel's and my time in the Benefice we have witnessed many changes. Both our mothers and fathers were promoted to glory, but four grandchildren were added to the family. And yes, we have lost a number of dear parishioners along the way, both church and non-church attendees, their names too numerous to mention, but you, dear reader, will remember quite a few.

I have found it a great honour to lead funerals. Saying goodbye to a loved-one is an important part of the journey of life, and it reminds us of our own mortality. And surely life is a series of deaths and resurrections. Even retirement is a kind of death! It's saying goodbye and thank you to people for their life-giving dedication and support over nearly 14 years: but it also feels like a bereavement, a letting go.

The service at Loddiswell ended with that rousing hymn with the refrain, "Thine be the glory, risen conquering Son, endless is the victory Thou o'er death hast won," and the organist, choir and the congregation really belted it out! During the last verse I got a bit choked up: this hymn is one of hope, and God's love for me ... and you. And what do you know? That was the last hymn at my Induction Service way back in 2001. For "new boy" Daniel and "old boy" John, the words of this hymn express not an end, but a beginning. What will retirement hold? When we move to our home in Okehampton, on 1st July, time will tell, but new beginnings await us just as they await the churches of this old Benefice.

Farewell and thank you for everything people of Stoke Fleming, Blackawton and Strete!

Village Life

Blackawton and Strete History Society

Devon History Society and Mediaeval Cookery

Blackawton and Strete History Group is affiliated to Devon History Society and it was our privilege to host our big sister's Spring Meeting on 25th April 2015. For the BASH organising committee, in some ways it was like giving birth in that the preparations took about nine months but the event itself went quickly and produced a good result!

BASH members and our guests visited our villages to learn about past events in this very special area of the South Hams. It was an all-day event with a fairly tight timetable, starting at 10.00 am in Blackawton Village Hall with introductions by Chairmen of both groups and refreshments served by Rosie, Jacqueline and Helen.

Historically speaking, our first item featured the 19th century with an analysis by Gareth James of the 1840 tithe map apportionments relating to the old parish of Blackawton, which at that time included Strete.

Amongst a number of fascinating things he was able to show that there were a huge number of orchards then - which have now all but disappeared. Bringing us forward to the beginning of the 20th century we proudly used this event to launch our latest publication – Lest We Forget – an exploration of the names on the war memorials of our two villages researched and written by BaSH member James Mussen (this is now on sale in the Community Shop). At 12 noon our guests were whisked from Blackawton onto mini buses for a conducted coastline tour from Dartmouth to Torcross to see where the practices took place for the Normandy landings in 1944.

The final stop was Strete Parish Hall. We sat down to a lunch with a difference, which had been dubbed a Mediaeval Munch. Lunch was eaten off a slice of trencher bread placed on a wooden trencher. Each course of food went on top of this (but if you felt very hungry you could eat your trencher bread too - hence the term 'trencherman' for a good eater!) We ate using wooden picks and spoons and sharp knives; no forks were provided unless specifically requested. We consumed several courses of mediaeval food, including spatchcocked quail, all washed down with home brewed mead or rosehip cordial. Delicious and filling too! Thanks to our 'Caterin' Kate Gill and the team of family and friends who worked hard to help her on the day. Special thanks to Rosa, Kate's young granddaughter, who worked with her in the months previously to test and develop the mediaeval recipes using the ingredients available now, and also set the tables, served the dishes and gathered wild 'sallat'.

After lunch we enjoyed an historic film of the evacuation of the area in 1943 which showed the preparations for the invasion of Normandy the following year. David Stranack spoke about the event and interviewed four of those who were youngsters living in Strete 72 years ago about their personal experiences. Those youngsters were Ken and Jean Parnell, Pam Wills and Roy Kendall. Thank you to them for sharing their memories with us. Before departing, guests were invited to partake of tea and a taste of mediaeval shortbread; this provoked comments like 'reminds me of Christmas'. Indeed you were nobody in mediaeval times if you were not able to afford spices in abundance.

Notes of the Annual General Meeting on Tuesday 12th May 2015

Notes only; for detail please refer to Blackawton Community Website: www.blackawtoncommunity.com. Cllrs Coe, Joyce, Lewis-Davis, Mallyon, Perry, Rake and Wills were present with 1 parishioner, David Shaw, George Hardy, Cllr Hicks (SHDC) and Steve Gale (Parish Clerk) attending. There were apologies from Cllr Hawkins (DCC).

Prior to the meeting, supporters of the proposed Dartmouth Swimming Pool gave a presentation on the scheme's funding and, in particular, the anticipated contribution of £0.4m from South Hams. Councillors agreed that a formal letter of support would be sent from Blackawton Parish Council.

Election of Chairman & Vice-Chairman

Cllrs Mallyon and Rake were unanimously re-elected as Chairman and Vice-Chairman.

Other Roles

Trevor Bird will now hand over his P3 work to local parishioners. It was hoped that Stanley Wreyford would continue in his role of Snow Warden for the Village and John Donaldson had agreed to represent the community in discussions on the development of local health services.

Statutory Notices

A number of legal requirements were met by confirming various documents and policies.

Reports from District Councillor

Cllr Hicks pointed out that South Hams Councillors' individual roles were being changed following the election. He would be taking specific responsibilities in respect of the commissioning of services.

Review of New Applications

The Parish Council's support for the following proposals was confirmed:

06/0640/15/F Combe Farm: Replacement of dilapidated agribuilding

06/0737/15/F Field Barn West of Washwalk. Infill to existing agricultural building.

Parish Plan

The Council will consider again writing an overall Parish Plan. Earlier work on such a document had been abandoned while attention had focussed on the new housing estate and the Community Shop.

Update on Current Financial Position

The Council's bank balances stood at £28,898.00. The total remaining after allowing for earmarked reserves of £21,938.85, and for payment of creditor* of £150.00, was £6,647.46. (*to South & West Internal Audit for audit services)

Reports from Councillors

- Reports of hubcap nuts on cars parked in the village being tampered with had been received. Parishioners were advised to check their vehicles before use.
- Cllr Lewis-Davis reported that no local children had taken advantage of the free bus rides to Dartmouth Youth Club although 3 youngsters who had gone to Dartmouth earlier had received a lift back. Use of the service would be monitored in the hope that its use by young people would develop in future.
- Cllr Joyce suggested that the Council devote time to publicising its work to the local community.
- A faulty street lamp in Chapel Street had been reported.
- The hedges on some local roads were once again starting to encroach onto the road.
- It was agreed to review the Council's website to ensure it was kept up-to-date and used more by local community groups and firms.

Clerk's Corner

Close Election Call!

The election for the Parish Council proved to be very close run and it threw up some interesting facts. The first thing to note was the extremely high turn-out with over three quarters of eligible people in the Parish doing their duty and voting. Turn-outs of less than 40% are commonplace in local elections and 76.8% in Blackawton is remarkable – even though the figure was doubtless inflated by the fact that the general election was being held at the same time.

The second thing to note is how close the local results were. Only 74 votes separated the councillor with most votes from the candidate who came last in the poll. Only 12 votes separated the councillor elected with the smallest number of votes and the next candidate who was not elected.

Hello, Goodbye!

Elections also, of course, means some warm welcomes and some sad good-byes. So a warm welcome back to Cllr Lorien Joyce who served briefly as a member of the Council a few years ago. A big "hello" too to Jack

Perry who has never stood for the Council before but has some experience of meetings etc. having been a former Chairman of the local Young Farmers Group. Despite being a newcomer, Jack polled only three votes less than Cllr Mallyon who topped the election results.

A farewell and thanks to Cllrs John Donaldson and Stanley Wreyford both of whom the Council is hoping will continue in fulfilling important roles in the community in connection with health service development and keeping our roads open when the snow comes around again. I must also say a big "thank you" to Trevor Bird who, after several years' service to the community variously as councillor, Council Chairman and P3 officer, has finally decided to call it a day. We wish him well.

Warning!! (1)

A few warnings this week to remind us all to be vigilant. Firstly, earlier this year, Trading Standards received complaints about unsolicited visits from doorstep traders offering gardening, building and driveway works. These complaints mention poor quality work, excessive costs, and even elderly people being driven to the bank to withdraw cash!

By law, doorstep traders have to give you, before you agree to a contract, written information - including their name and address, how much the work will cost and how long it will take to complete. They also have to give you a written notice telling you about your right to a 14 day cooling off period - although you can decide to have work done during this period, if you want to.

Trading Standards always advise not to enter into contracts with unsolicited visitors to your home. Take your time and always get 3 quotes for any work that you want to be done. Always get a second opinion if you are told by an unsolicited visitor that you need work doing to your home. If you want advice, details of approved traders, or to complain about a doorstep trader, please call Citizens Advice on 03454 040506. If you feel threatened by a doorstep caller, contact the police.

Warning!! (2)

Police have been alerted by an 82yr-old South Hams resident of being called by a man informing them that someone was emptying their bank account. The man asked them to confirm bank details, which they did, the resident became suspicious and the caller transferred them to someone claiming to be a police officer from Scotland Yard. An attempt to withdraw £18,000 from her account was made that day but, fortunately, the fraud was spotted and the account stopped in time.

It is clear that these fraudsters are targeting older people in the belief that they are easy prey. Of course, that is not always the case, but does make the crime that much more unpleasant. Remember that your bank or the police will never contact you unexpectedly to ask you for personal banking details, and in no circumstances will anyone have a legitimate need to know your PIN number. If you have any doubts about a call that you receive, hang up and call your bank using a different phone. Any information about this type of crime can be passed on to 101 or via Crimestoppers on 0800 555111.

Warning!! (3)

Back to the very centre of the Village, drivers are advised to check their tyres before driving off. A number of tyres have been vandalised recently and hubcap nuts removed with potentially disastrous results.

Youth Club Available Again

It has been a long time since Blackawton's local Youth Club closed. Thanks to a new scheme developed by the Parish Council, transport is now available so that our kids can safely get to and return from Dartmouth Youth Club to use the facilities there on a Thursday evening.
