Reader's Corner

This is the 'silly season' when it is said the 'major' journalists are on holiday so we often see or hear stories that make us question our (or their) sanity. I wonder if God listens to the news. To me the phrase 'God forgive us' immediately springs to mind. In the last 24 hours (today is August 10th), I have heard of a stabbing in England, another shooting in America, both racially motivated, and I have watched the gatherings in Japan to remember Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

It is one of the great myths of our time that most conflict is down to 'religion' ... simply, statistically not true. However, we have to take seriously the domination in the news of so-called Islamic State – a grotesque distortion of one of the great Abrahamic faiths. I read recently that it is revolutions in communication that have preceded or coincided with major changes in the world order. For instance, the printed word and the protestant revolution of Martin Luther.

We now have another revolution in communication – the internet, smart phones, and social media. 'Islamic State' seems to be extremely good at using this form of communication, and therein lies a great danger to us. They don't need a country or even a leader: they can recruit worldwide ... they just need the internet. Somehow we need to combat this threat ... to show a better way, through the only One who can break through into peoples' lives with love and peace without internet or printing press, who makes the difference in our world for good and not for evil. We only need to whisper 'help', and the climate changes.

But it's summer and the sun has broken through. So for now let's learn how to relax, how to rest, and how to let go of our often over-organised life ... and allow God to bathe us in His peace.

Notes of the Parish Council Meeting on Tuesday 4th August 2015

Notes only; for detail please refer to Blackawton Community Website: www.blackawtoncommunity.com. Cllrs Coe, Joyce, Lewis-Davis, Mallyon (Chairman), Rake and Wills were present with John Donaldson, Arthur and Carole Wotton, Cllr Hicks (SHDC), Steve Gale (Parish Clerk) and one parishioner attending. There were apologies from Cllr Perry and Cllr Hawkins (DCC).

Footpaths and Bridleways Planning

Arthur and Carole Wotton introduced themselves to members and reported on their work since taking over P3 responsibilities. Generally, the parish footpaths and bridleways were in a reasonable condition

and any problems raised had been resolved. They were currently preparing a report for the DCC P3 organiser. A discussion on responsibilities for hedge trimming took place.

Reports from District Councillor

Cllr Hicks had pursued progress on the Town Farm development and, in particular, the Employment Units. Cavanna's were only likely to provide these units once 80% of the property on the site had been sold. The Council was updated on progress on District's re-organisation.

Comments on Planning Applications

The following had been granted conditional planning approval:

06/1215/15/F Thorne Farm entrance etc.

06/1376/15/F George Inn retrospective application external works

Healthcare and Health Services Planning

John Donaldson had attended a number of consultation meetings concerning the development of local health and social care services. This would involve a major removal of services from Dartmouth Hospital, Victoria Road Surgery and Anzac Street premises to a possible new facility in Townstal. Many services could also be moved to the local area from Torbay Hospital. The reshaped services would comply with and deliver a completely new model of care which is in the final stages of drafting and will be launched on 30 September for extensive local consultation.

A detailed discussion ensued during which the integration of health and social care, the difficulty in recruiting staff locally and the ownership of Dartmouth Hospital were raised. It was warned that the continual reorganisation of health and social care has had a negative impact. Any further change must ensure that real improvements are delivered.

Neighbourhood Planning

The councillors held the view that the time involved with the production of such a plan – and its essential updating and maintenance – were unlikely to produce sufficient benefits to make it worthwhile. Cllr Hicks will invite a South Hams officer to a future meeting to discuss such issues, including the impact of housing planning.

Update on Current Financial Position

The Council's bank balances currently stood at £34,821.52. The total remaining, after allowing for earmarked reserves of £25,928.26 and for payments of creditors of £275.00 was £8,618.26.

Payments Due and Received

A payment of £230 was agreed for cemetery etc. maintenance.

Request for Funding

Friends of Blackawton School (FOBS) had requested Parish Council funds toward some goal posts for the school. Cllr Joyce undertook to invite a FOBS representative to a future meeting.

Fire Services

The local Fire Prevention Officer had offered to talk to the Parish Council about home safety visits and requesting information on vulnerable groups. It was agreed to invite him to a future meeting.

Future for Blackawton after Town Farm

A letter from a parishioner concerning potential development of the village to the south was reported. It was agreed that the Council would always seek to protect all of the parish from inappropriate development.

Woodford Bridge

A parishioner had pointed out that the bridge between Blackawton and Woodford was overgrown. It was agreed to identify the responsibility for clearing the area where the roadway, verge and watercourse meet.

Reports from Parish Councillors, Wardens etc.

Myrtle Way was again reported as being overgrown. A report on the South Hams seminar held on 27 July was provided by Cllrs Mallyon and Rake.

Clerk's Corner

Another Solar Park Application

A number of people will have visited the public exhibition on outline proposals for Oldstone Farm held in April. Well, the formal application is now in and comments (either for or against) from the public on the plan for 4 fields of solar panels are required by South Hams **before 4th September**. The Parish Council will also be discussing this at its meeting on **Tuesday 1st September**. This meeting will, of course, be held in public and you are welcome to come along to listen to the debate. Full details are on the South Hams website. The planning reference is 06/1725/15/F.

Local Health Services

A number of concerns on local health issues including the future of Dartmouth Hospital and the development of the Dartmouth Medical Practice were again considered by the Parish Council. The blueprint for future services is being worked on by all involved in local health services and is due to be published on 30th September. We all await the document with much interest!

Another Scam!!

A warning from the Police: Residents are receiving phone calls from abroad, in particular India, reference the owners computers needing urgent repair and that they need to accept software on their computer called Team Viewer which gives the caller remote access to control the computer. They are targeting elderly residents and requesting bank transfers in the region of £9500 to fix the problem and only when the money has been transferred. Local banks have stated that the fraudsters are aware that anything under £10,000 will not be raised as an issue by the bank. The callers purport to be calling from Micro Tech in India using the name of John or Michael Watson or Windows Technical Support using the name of Frederick calling on number 0208 2621858. Please be aware of such calls, do not enter into any transactions or provide any personal details. Please advise any elderly neighbours, family or friends regarding this scam.

the Wider Community

South Devon Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust

After nine years' service I shall be retiring as a governor of South Devon Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust (Torbay Hospital) as from the end of February 2016. South Hams has three elected governors and two of us are standing down this time, so there is an opportunity for someone in our parish to be a candidate in the forthcoming autumn elections.

Why should you consider it?

As you probably know, the trust is in the final stages of negotiating the formation of an integrated care organisation (ICO) with Torbay and Southern Devon Health and Care NHS Trust (formerly Torbay Care Trust) which currently runs the social care and community hospitals in our area. This will be the first

integration of its type - between an acute trust and a social care trust - anywhere in England. There will therefore be national, as well as local, interest in how it develops. The benefits to patients in having a 'joined-up' service should be considerable.

The Council of Governors is set up to hold the trust's board of directors to account and above all to seek assurance that the trust can continue to deliver services according to the terms of its licence. It is an important role. The governors, not the board, have to make the final decision on whether to embark on ICO and we expect to do this in September. Once the ICO gets under way, all current governors will continue as governors of the new organisation, which - among many other responsibilities - will then be operating Dartmouth and Totnes hospitals.

The role of a governor will have to expand and should be even more interesting than it is now. I have thoroughly enjoyed my three terms of office. Space does not allow me to explain fully what the duties of a governor are, but the job is as time-consuming as you want it to be and the only legal requirement is to attend two of the four council meetings each year. If you have more time, there are many ways to get further involved.
