Reader's Ramblings

At the time of writing this article we are well into the season of Advent, a time of waiting and preparing for Christmas. It is a call of peace and hope. The conditions in Britain are summed up brilliantly in that famous poem by John Betjeman:

Its dark at breakfast, dark at tea, And in between we only see Clouds hurrying across the sky And rain-wet roads the wind blows dry And branches bending to the gale Against the skies all silver-pale.

It is a time of deep and dark shadows when we wonder if the sun will ever shine again. My little dog has got it sussed. He is oblivious to the weather and when he comes into the house if he finds it hot he lies on his back, with his feet in the air and waits for someone to tickle his tummy. I have to say that I have tried this and surprising nobody seems interested! Back to Advent. From across time the Advent bells call out about salvation and hope, it is a call that brings light into the shadows. A good Advent recognises that the darkness will not overcome it.

The church fathers did not pick 25th December to celebrate the birth of Christ because they thought it was the actual day Mary gave birth, but because that was the time when the pre-Christian people were celebrating the new birth of the sun. Our ancestors had ways to woo the sun god back. So strong was their faith that, year after year, they did succeed in wooing the great light back! But we know that darkness does not exist in itself: it is the absence of something - of light - so one light, one single light, shatters the darkness, however deep it is, and lights the way to itself.

One of the wonderful things about Christmas is the look on children's faces as they see the Christmas tree light up. We seem as adults to lose our sense of anticipation and wonder. Maybe the heart of a good Advent

is rediscovering that sense of expectation. My own position is summed up in the words of that beautiful hymn by Horatio Bonar (1809-89):

I looked to Jesus, and I found In Him my star, my sun; And in the light of life I'll walk Til travelling days are done.

I hope you had a wonderful Christmas and that 2024 will bring you great joy. God bless you all.

Tree Warden from Bob Harvey

Tree Planting

This is the best time of the year to plant trees as they have plenty of time to develop their roots well before possible droughts. For native trees you can buy a 2-year-old bare-rooted slip, plus bamboo cane, plus protective spiral for only £2 - £3, so plant a few and keep the strongest. Plant by slicing the soil with a spade, second slice to make a "T" shape, lift and shove the tree in the slot formed by the stem of the "T". Easy - little trees are tough. I have at Lower Clyston a few dozen new canes and tubes which I'm happy to give to anyone who asks. Phone to check 01803 712662.

Big estates often plant a single parkland tree, staked and surrounded by hefty wooden stakes and wire fencing. Then the tree dies! Keeping the tree clear of weeds for a year or two is proven to be a great help, but it also exposes the tree to drying out in a drought.

Species? Consider native Wild Cherry, or Gean. Explanation next month.

Sustainable Blackawton

Formed many years ago with a focus on environmental issues, this group has achieved some small successes. The habitat group distributed many illustrated booklets about helping biodiversity across the South Hams, and this small group has recently won an award, our river champions will be sampling water quality all along our local river, the Gara, and tree planting and hedge management continues across our parish. But what exactly does "sustainable" mean? Dictionary definitions are all very well but tend to be general rather than specific. What is a "sustainable village"?

Blackawton seems to me to be the very definition of this! A school, play group, a pub, a brilliant community shop, allotments, play park, village hall, community meadow, football pitch, tennis court, our WI, our community bus, this monthly newsletter, all of these are very important . . . but none of these would be successful and "sustainable" without the dedication, effort and time of so many local people!

In the December edition of the Beacon thanks were expressed to the many people who contribute, edit, print, collate and distribute the newsletter, every month, throughout our parish. Our brilliant platoons of volunteers make this parish a wonderful place to live, to call home. They organise and manage so much of what goes on here, annual events like the amazing fireworks display in November, our village day and "International festival of Worm Charming" in the Spring, street cricket on Boxing Day, and ad hoc events in the school, the pub and – oh yes! – the Village Hall.

A recent initiative from Sustainable South Hams, with much welcome support from SHDC, is requesting parishes to register their interest in some forthcoming "composting" trials. The first of these is a project on converting the old, now redundant, brown bins into a water butt or wormery. Anyone out there interested in accompanying me to a session on how to do this please call me 01803 712131.

"Farm Carbon Toolkit" helps farmers register the carbon captured by their soils, hedges and trees, potentially offering future carbon offset income for landowners managing their land sustainably. See farmcarbontoolkit.org.uk

Thermal survey of households is now possible due to the loan of a thermal imaging camera from SHDC. Thank you to everyone who came to see the December Nativity concert, performed by Nursery and Class 1 (2 - 5 year old's) It certainly got us all into the Christmas spirit. The school rounded off 2023 with the annual Candlelit Christmas service, which saw a return of the candlelit procession around the village and into the church. The whole school, including children ages 5 - 11 put on a fabulous show with some entertaining lyrics to some old favourite Christmas Carols. Thank you to the Blackawton Carol singers who lead the way for a great Christmas Sing along. It really was a great finale to the month of December which saw the children enjoy making natural wreaths, a 'whole school together' Christmas dinner, festive math challenges, astronomy stop animation and lots more!

Thank you to Blackawton village shop for all the money raised through their Christmas raffle.

It takes a few of days to settle back into the swing of things, but there is, as always, lots going on this term. Year 4 will be visiting an Islamic Centre as part of the schools drive for cultural diversity. Forest School, including children of all ages have launched a programme to protect the White Spot moth. The White Spot Moth is endangered in these parts and the larvae feed on only one plant called Nottingham Catchfly. This plant is no longer common in this area, so we are working with The Local Habitat Group to plant more Nottingham Catchfly plants. If you would like to help encourage this species to Devon, please buy some seeds and plant them. Hopefully, by working together, we can save the White Spot Moth from extinction.

Village Hall Roof

Most local people will know there has been a problem with the roof of this important community building, but may not know the extent of the problem. Deterioration of support structures, although repaired a few years ago by volunteers, meant not only was the roof leaking but there was risk of it becoming unsafe. It was decided by the village hall committee that this "problem", imperative that it be addressed soon, should be converted into an "opportunity", so planning was sought to raise the roof a little and construct an open roof internally, allowing more possibilities for the use of the hall. Planning permission was granted eventually, the parish council supported our application for grant funding of the roof materials from the developers \$106 moneys, and a team of volunteer labour, managed by our amazing village hall chairman, was formed to do the work. Our chairman, Martin Joyce of TJD, has not only organised and managed this team of volunteers but, due to much bureaucratic delay, also funded materials which we are assured will be recompensed by the promised \$106 fund. Joycey you are amazing, PLEASE never leave Blackawton!

Anyone seeing the work involved, over the last weekend in November, in stripping and reconstructing the roof, and the gable walls that also proved to be unsafe, will have been stunned that a small village not only has the skill set and ability, but also the commitment and dedication, to achieve such a mammoth task! Perhaps more volunteer labour might be forthcoming for the inevitable task of cleaning up and redecorating that will be necessary before this project is complete? **Please volunteer** if you can help with this when reconstruction is completed.

My reason for this article is to SHOUT from the rooftops a HUGE THANK YOU to everyone involved in this project – our Village Hall is a critical resource for Blackawton and we look forward to celebrating the re-opening as an important, fundamental, sustainable resource of this rural community.

The Thoughts of Chairman Rake

Stuff and nonsense

On the whole, I'm generally a fairly cheery and optimistic sort of person; glass half full, tomorrow is another day and all that. But I know that hidden inside there is a grump, a grouch, a grinch. Over the years I have learned pretty well what triggers the emergence of my inner grump. The appearance of certain people on the radio or television (curiously, mostly politicians), for instance, can quickly drag thunderclouds across my sunny blue skies and lead to a brief period of rage and fury.

Unfortunately, and I hesitate to admit this, another thing that can set me off is Christmas. Not the family gatherings, carols, or food. Not even the ridiculous rom-coms about winsome individuals discovering 'the true meaning of Christmas' after a series of unfortunate events. No, all these things I can enjoy or at least tolerate. My annual yuletide trigger is the stuff. All the stuff. So much stuff. So I should have been on my guard when I recently found myself at a loose end in Exeter for the best part of a day. I could have done the sensible thing and whiled away the time at the excellent Royal Albert Memorial Museum, with its eclectic and entertaining collection of art, fossils, stuffed animals and Devon-related memorabilia. Instead, I wandered around the busy shopping streets, getting more and more enraged by the stuff.

For some reason I find Christmas stuff even more aggravating than usual stuff. This annual tsunami of objects decorated with ubiquitous motifs like holly leaves or reindeer, made in far-off lands where no holly has ever grown or reindeer ever trod, and then shipped here seemingly with the sole purpose of annoying me. I returned home feeling gloomy and irate, burdened down by the sheer weight of it all.

Luckily I was able to hasten my inner grinch's return to his lair with a corrective. I remembered an article from 2016 that said that whatever the evidence of my eyes in Exeter, we are actually consuming less stuff. I scuttled off to the Office of National Statistics (well, its website at least) to see if this hopeful trend had continued. To my delight it sort of has. It seems that we hit peak stuff in 2004 when the UK's consumption of raw materials hit 1.4 billion tonnes, the equivalent to a whopping 24.5 tonnes per person. By 2020 this figure had dropped to 14.2 tonnes per person, still a lot of stuff, when you think about it, but much less than at the peak. The figures also show that we are being smarter with how we use the stuff we use. At peak stuff we used 813 tonnes of raw materials to produce every £1 million of GDP. Now we generate the same amount of GDP with just 473 tonnes of stuff.

Of course there is further to go, and the figures only go up to 2020 so we don't yet know how we did through the upheaval of recent years. But the trend is downwards and there are many reasons to think this could continue: things are getting smaller, and we are getting smarter about how we design and manufacture

them (or get people in those faraway lands to manufacture them); we are getting better at replacing raw materials with recycled materials (not yet great, but better); and most importantly we are changing our behaviour. As consumers we are shifting from things (which need a lot of stuff) to experiences (which generally use less), as well as being more thoughtful about the things that we do consume. We are not just reducing our 14 tonnes, but using them more wisely.

So, I have cheered up and learned my lesson. I promise to be less angry and judgmental about Christmas jumpers and holly-bedecked nick-nacks. And next time, I will spend my idle hours in Exeter looking at stuffed giraffes and not just at stuff. I might still shout at those people on the telly though.

I hope that the New Year brings you all the things and experiences you could wish for.

Blackawton Parish Council meeting

Notes of the Meeting of Blackawton Parish Council held on Tuesday 5th December 2023 at 7.30 pm in St Michael's Church, Blackawton. Complete minutes can be read at **www.blackawtoncommunity.com** or the parish noticeboard.

Open Forum

No members of the public present.

Present: Parish & South Hams District Cllr Rake (Chair), Parish Cllrs Oughton (Vice-Chair), Coe, Luckens, Mardon, and Thomas were present, as was Devon County Cllr Brazil (for his report), and A Thom (Clerk). There were no members of the public.

Apologies

Apologies for absence were received from Cllr Hadow.

Declarations of Interest

None declared.

Report from South Hams District Council Councillor

Cllr Rake said that today, 5th December, is International Volunteers Day and thanked Parish Councillors for being volunteers.

Cllr Rake discussed recent progress in the appeal of SHDC decisions to refuse applications to develop the Dairy Crest site in Totnes. There is a proposal to drop one of two appeals (because the required information has been provided subject to a satisfactory S106). Only an outline planning permission has been applied for. The Totnes Community Development Society is concerned that the project is too complicated for the development to progress. We are awaiting the Inspector's decision.

There is a vote next week regarding Plymouth and South Devon Freeport sites in Plymouth Docks, Sherford, and Langage.

A deal has been agreed in principle for a devolution deal for Devon. It will be considered by Devon County Council on 19 December. DCC and Torbay Councils would become a combined authority. Spending on skills and training and business development would be transferred to the combined authority. The specific details of the offer remain to be determined.

The changeover by SHDC to the new waste system appears to be going smoothly. Cllr Rake has only received a couple of queries.

Report from Devon County Council Councillor

Cllr Brazil suggested BPC progress with the project to consult the community about whether to change Blackawton's street lighting and to then give DCC a request about which lights Blackawton wants on or off, and for what hours. Cllr Brazil said to be careful with the wording of the consultation because DCC may not agree to implement the request.

There is currently no Slapton Line meeting scheduled. They are waiting for a DCC Highways' Planning Report. The Adaptation Plan needs to progress. There is some money to improve back roads and an extra £6.6 million has been received from Government for all of Devon's highways.

Cllr Brazil was asked to investigate the street light next to 1 Tumbling Fields which has been left on for many weeks.

There is a special Cabinet meeting on 19 December regarding a Devon Devolution Deal. Details of the proposal are to follow. A consultation will start after the meeting.

There is a consultation about parking meters being installed in Dartmouth which will run from 7 December to 7 January.

Churchyard Grounds Maintenance

The completion of 2023 works was confirmed with the exception of the path and gate from School Lane into the Churchyard. The contractor will be asked to do that work when next in the village.

Maintenance of the Closed Churchyard

The Report on the Clerk and Cllr Rake's site meeting with an SHDC Officer was discussed. It was arranged to help Cllrs to prepare to make an informed decision if a request is received from the PCC for BPC to take legal responsibility for the maintenance of the closed St Michael's churchyard.

Community Consultation about Street Lighting in Blackawton

DCC has not made progress with reviewing its Street Lighting Policy - which BPC has been waiting for. It was decided, as recommended by DCC Cllr Brazil, to proceed with a community consultation. The results of that consultation will then be used to propose to DCC a 12-month trial of the preferred change, if any. Options: a) lighting remains as is, b) lighting from the Normandy Arms corner to the Millcombe Corner as is, with other village street lights removed, c) no street lighting in the village, d) Other. The consultation will be added to the January Beacon for distribution. There will be an online form. Paper forms can be returned to the Community Shop and to The George Inn if the publican wishes. The results will be used to make a request to DCC to trial the preferred option for 12 months, if a change is requested by the majority of respondents. BPC will not know in advance if DCC will agree to the request.

Thermal Imaging Camera Hire from SHDC

Sustainable Blackawton has borrowed a camera from SHDC. It is available to survey houses in the Parish. Cllr Coe is a contact and will write an article for the Beacon offering a survey to those who want their house done.



Street Lighting Survey

One issue frequently raised with the Parish Council is whether we should seek to change the arrangements for street lighting in the village.

There are good arguments both for change and for maintaining the status quo. It is clear that removing the street lighting would save energy and reduce light pollution in this rural setting. For certain residents, street lights have a direct effect inside their homes, which can be difficult to deal with. On the other hand, the street lights can be considered as enhancing road safety in the village and general security, and as enabling safer walking and cycling.

It should also be borne in mind that the final decision on any change to street lighting would be taken by Devon County Council, who may prove unwilling to make any changes irrespective of how much support any given proposal receives. However, evidence of support for a proposal would lend weight to any request.

The first step is therefore to ask you for your opinion about Blackawton's street lights and whether change is desirable.

In broad terms we would like you to consider three possible options that have been suggested:

- 1) Leaving things as they are.
- 2) Removing street lights apart from those on Main Street & Vicarage Road between The Normandy and Millcombe Corner (more or less the bus stop to the village hall).
- 3) Removing all street lights.
- 4) Retaining street lights but reducing the hours of use.

In an ideal world, we would be able to 'trial' a change by turning the relevant lights off for a period over the coming year but leaving them in place. Again this would depend on DCC and thus on the levels of support or opposition that you express through this survey.

We would welcome your views below, or on the online form that will be available on the website by the time you read this (the online form makes it easier for us, as it saves on data entry). As this is only the first part of the process, we have kept the questionnaire short. Depending on the replies we receive, more detailed consultation may be carried out.
