

Reader's Corner from Peter Barker

The splendid news was announced on May 21 that Revd Matt Gorton has been appointed as the new priest-in-charge of the Coast and Country Mission Community consisting of Stoke Fleming, Strete, Blackawton and East Allington parishes. I'm sure you will join me in extending a warm welcome to Matt and his family who will be moving into the Rectory in Stoke Fleming in mid-July. Matt will be introducing himself in the next issue, and he will be officially licensed by Bishop James to begin his ministry here at a special service on Tuesday, 1st August, at 7 pm at St Andrew's, East Allington.

The phone rang. Once I would have answered brightly, 'Good Morning. Peter Barker speaking.' But I'm sure I've not been alone in getting so many nuisance calls and outright scams for years now. My habitual reply to the phone has become increasingly curt and suspicious. 'Hello,' I answered in an off-putting tone. To my surprise, and delight, it was Revd Matt! Oh dear, what an embarrassing start! As I switched to a warm and welcoming voice I hoped that my initial gruffness could be attributed to a crackle on the line. Trust: the vital cement that binds together a family, a community, a nation. The issue of trust is right at the top of the news agenda as I write. Should MPs be able to trust the word of the Prime Minister? Should we be able to trust the words of our MPs? Without trust we are all cast adrift. Yet, sadly, it seems that politicians today are little more trusted than the voices on the phone claiming to speak for 'Microsoft' or 'Amazon'. In a world where there is so much deception all around, our laudable and necessary concern for everyone's safety is leading us to teach ourselves and our children a default setting of distrust. Village Life

River Gara Water Vole Reintroduction Project

Many of you will have already heard about the project to reintroduce water voles to our local river, the Gara. With more than 90% of Britain's water voles extinct due to habitat loss and predation by escaped American mink, they are a very rare sight these days and the River Gara, which rises in Blackawton and then flows through Strete and Slapton parishes, is an ideal habitat with lots of the vegetation-rich banks that voles love. Discussions with landowners along the Gara has shown strong support for the idea and so that left one big unanswered question – were there any American mink still in the valley? A single mink can wipe out an entire vole colony in a very short time. Five mink traps have now been positioned along the length of the Gara for the last four months and not a single mink has appeared and this finally gave the group the green light for the project.

Water voles are a keystone species, meaning that they have a disproportionately positive effect on their environment relative to their numbers. By nibbling vegetation alongside the river, water voles create flower rich banks with a lot of plant diversity which benefits bees, moths, butterflies and other pollinators and also the mammals, birds and bats that then feed on those insects. Water voles themselves are food for a wide range of animals including herons, otters, stoats, pike and owls.

The other key to the project succeeding was enlisting the help of a water vole expert. After visiting a West Devon farmer and naturalist by the name of Derek Gow, and seeing his water vole rich ponds, the group knew they'd found their man. He came and walked the Gara and confirmed that not only was the river perfect water vole habitat but pointed out that they would soon spread down into Slapton Ley. Having done other water vole reintroductions before Derek was very clear that the only way to establish a viable and genetically diverse population was to have at least four introduction sites and release, over two years, a total of 800 voles.

Such a comprehensive long term project doesn't come cheap but lots of local donations and a Farming in Protected Landscapes grant has enabled the group to set the project going and Derek Gow has now got busy breeding the first 200 voles that will be needed for the initial release in July. They will be carefully monitored and then followed by three further introductions over the next two years. Before too long you should be able to spot their little bankside meadows and entrance holes in the bank and hear that plop as they jump in the water at your approach.

20's Plenty for Us

In last month's Beacon, I highlighted the "20's plenty for us" campaign and sought views from parishioners. Thanks to all who responded. The results were both overand under-whelming. Over-whelming in that 100% of respondents fully supported the initiative. Under-whelming in that there were only 9 respondents representing less than 4% of the households in the village.

20^{mph}

Across the UK, 20mph is increasingly becoming the "norm" where people live, work or play. At last month's Blackawton Parish Council meeting Devon County Cllr. Julian Brazil made it clear that the County Council (DCC) has neither the funding

nor the manpower to implement more than a handful of 20mph schemes each year — and there's a long waiting list. Even if we could "self fund" a scheme for the village DCC would not have the manpower to implement it. So there we have it. We're extremely unlikely to have "official" and enforceable 20mph signs erected in Blackawton any time soon.

According to DCC, we could erect our own signs but they must not resemble the "official" signs (black numbers in a red circle). The (red) heart shaped logo above is apparently acceptable. Any such signage could only be erected on parishioners' private property/land – not on the public highway and it would not be enforceable – simply advisory. This might at least cause drivers to consider their speed.

The nearby parish of Frogmore and Sherford has recently implemented a "do it yourself" scheme along these lines. Based on the outcome of last month's mini-survey, I think we would need a greater level of support before considering such a scheme in our village. This brings the number of Councillors up to six — our full quota is seven, so there is still one place left to be filled. Blackawton Parish Council meeting

Notes of the Meetings of Blackawton Parish Council held on Tuesday 6th June 2023 at 7.30 pm in Blackawton Village Hall. Complete minutes can be read at **www.blackawtoncommunity.com** or the parish noticeboard.

Present: Parish & South Hams District Cllr Rake (Chair), Parish Cllrs Oughton(Vice-Chair), Coe, Hadow, Mardon, and Thomas were present, as was Devon County Cllr Brazil (for his report), A Thom (Clerk), and two members of the public for the Open Forum.

Open Forum

Re-introduction of Water Voles to the River Gara. Two members of the public provided an update on the project to reintroduce water voles into the river Gara. Water Voles are a keystone species: they have a positive effect on habitat and other wildlife. Water voles will be reintroduced at four sites over four events: the first event will take place this summer. The total cost of the project is £27,000 of which £11,000 has been raised so far. Further donations are welcomed, Details about how to donate will be advertised, including on the Blackawton community website.

Apologies

All Cllrs attended.

Co-option to fill two vacancies for Blackawton Parish Councillors

It was unanimously resolved to co-opt Sue Hadow to be a Parish Councillor. Cllr Hadow signed the Declaration of Acceptance of Office. There is one remaining vacancy for a Blackawton Parish Councillor.

Declarations of Interest

It was unanimously resolved to approve the written requests for dispensations to speak and vote for four years received from Cllrs Rake and Thomas regarding their other registerable interest as founding Directors of the Blackawton Business Units CIC.

Cllr Rake declared a personal interest in the Clyston Barton planning application.

Report from Devon County Council Councillor

DCC Cllr Brazil reported that the Children's Scrutiny Committee met today. The DCC Chief Executive attended the meeting. The Service is failing vulnerable children. It is hoped that central government will provide funds to meet the deficit in the Special Education Needs budget: currently £130 million and increasing by £30 to £40 million per year.

A scheme is being considered to use stainless steel gabion baskets, filled with local stone and anchored in place, on Slapton Line. The same approach has been used at Beesands, where they have been in place for three to four years. Slapton Line is designated a Sites of Special Scientific Interest and its description needs to be changed to allow use of the gabion baskets. The description of the project needs to be changed to 'hold the line' rather than a managed retreat. Money would be required from central government to fund the work.

Cllr Brazil was asked about the '20's Plenty' 20 miles per hour campaign. He said that Frogmore has used green 20 mph signs.

Report from South Hams District Council Councillor

Councillor Rake reported that the new SHDC Council held its first full council meeting on 25 May. Cllr Brazil is the Leader of the Council. Cllr Rake is Chair of the Licensing Committee, and sitting on the Development Management and the Audit and Governance Committees. Seventeen of the thirty-one SHDC councillors are new to SHDC.

Planning Applications

Review of New Applications

1181/23/HHO & 1182/23/LBC. Clyston Barton Blackawton TQ9 7AB. Householder application & Listed building consent for proposed alterations to include new artist's studio, replacement veranda and energy efficiency measures including solar panels to garage roof and rear garden, air source heat pump and replacement windows. Cllr Rake left the meeting. It was unanimously resolved to **Support**. Cllr Rake returned to the meeting.

1449/23/FUL. Land At SX 830492. Provision of temporary agricultural worker's dwelling at Cornish Post Farm. Neighbouring Parish Consultee. It was unanimously resolved to respond **No comment**.

Consultations

Government consultation, new Infrastructure Levy to reform S106 and CIL system of development contributions. Closes 9 June 2023. Cllrs may choose to comment on an individual basis.

Use of S106 Funds for works to Village Hall's Roof

It was resolved to grant Cllrs Oughton and Coe who are members of the Village Hall Management Committee dispensations to speak and vote on this item. It was resolved to grant Cllr Rake who is a SHDC Cllr a dispensation to speak and vote on this item.

It was unanimously resolved to support the Village Hall using for the bulk of the remaining S106 funds from French Furze (approximate balance £48,000) to help to pay for the works to the roof.

Cemetery Safety Testing

Cllrs reported on memorial safety testing done in May. Memorials were laid flat in the Churchyard (three) and in the Cemetery (two). It was noted that Allwood of Totnes will be reinstating the two memorials laid flat in the Cemetery. The Parish Council is seeking to notify the owners of the memorials. The family names

on the three memorials laid flat in the Churchyard are Beer, Kerswell, and Pulleyblank. After the next allareas cut Cllrs will prepare a list of all memorials laid flat in the Churchyard for circulation.

Safety testing will be done again in one year. The Clerk was asked to arrange for the water collection butt in the Cemetery to be checked and if necessary repaired.

Avenue of Cherry Trees in the Churchyard Management Consultation

It was agreed that the next step regarding the management of the cherry trees is to collate options available, which can then form the basis of a community consultation. Cllr Rake will write an article for the Beacon calling for ideas. The call for options will also be placed in the Shop. This will be an item on the 4 July meeting's Agenda.

"20's Plenty" Campaign

This will be an item on the 4 July meeting's Agenda.

Registration of The George Inn as an Asset of Community Value

It was resolved to grant Cllr Coe a dispensation to speak and vote on this item. It was agreed that Cllr Rake will discuss the possibility of the registration with SHDC officers. This will be an item on the 4 July meeting's Agenda.

French Furze - Transfer of the ownership of the 'School Land'

Cllr Rake reported that in his role as SHDC Cllr he has examined the planning approval history and noted some issues. He is meeting with the S106 Officer and a Planning Officer next Tuesday. Vistry is hosting a follow-up meeting with DCC, SHDC, and BPC on 26 June. Cllr Rake will follow up the safety issues raised at BPC's request after the 16 May meeting.

2022/23 Annual Governance and Accountability Return

2022/23 Internal Audit Report. The Report concludes that BPC used proper practices. The Clerk has prepared a list of the Recommendations made in the Report to further support the lowering of risk to the Council, some have been addressed and some require further review.





What should we do about the trees?

Phasing of work

The cherry trees along the path between the door of the church and Cousins Cross are nearing (if not already at) the end of their lives. Some are clearly ailing and the rest are going that way. Arboriculturists we have consulted have indicated that the cherry trees are in a declining and generally poor condition with a probable low life expectancy.

The question, then, is what we should do. The choice broadly speaking is between taking all the trees down at the same time and replanting (which would be easier and cheaper, and would also perhaps maintain a more uniform appearance as new trees grow up together), or taking them down individually over the next few years and replanting as we go (which would be less of a visual shock, and would have the continuity of at least some mature trees for wildlife).

In both cases there is then the question of what sort of trees we should plant in the place of the cherries. Should we replant an avenue of the same species or mix things up? It is worth bearing in mind that we have already planted a couple of younger flowering cherries to fill gaps in the avenue of trees.
