Hedges

FREE hedge leaflets, devised by children at Blackawton School, are in the village shop, but there are two actual examples of good and poor hedge management worth a glance to your left as you drive from Blackawton to Totnes Cross.

From Hutcherleigh Turn, the hedge bank on the left is scalped; tidy as suburbia. Carbon absorption is negligible, ecological habitat virtually zero. Cutting costs about £15 every year.

From the old lane down to Wood Farm to the first metal gate, the hedge on the left has been left to grow upwards for 12 years, but necessarily flailed on the road side every year. Copious carbon absorption, maximum wildlife habitat, and seventeen young oak trees growing up without help.

Cutting costs about £5 each year and after 20 years this hedge can be harvested for firewood and sold at a profit of about £400. Furthermore, the Government pays £9 a year for NOT cutting it. So over 20 years the flailed hedge COSTS the owner £300, whereas the growing hedge PAYS the owner over £500. Costings are from a dairy farmer in Devon already practising this system.

Water quality and river health

We attended a training session hosted by Westcountry Rivers Trust and South Devon River Champions. This introduction to the Citizen Science Investigation into the health and water quality of our water bodies was extremely well managed and attended by people from several of the rivers in South Devon.

Our plan is to agree several sampling points along the Gara. Volunteers are needed to take regular water samples, at least once a month, and occasionally extra samples following extreme weather such as droughts and storms or incidents of pollution from agricultural runoff or sewage spills. It would also be helpful if users of the river, dog walkers and nature lovers etc., would report any problems they see, unusual foam or pollution, bank erosion, and such like. Training in the correct use of sampling kits is provided, and data collected will form useful information for the Environment Agency to hold SWWater to account.

The health of our waterways has become a serious cause for concern, and this CSI will assist in enabling the EA to improve their monitoring of various pollution incidents, even though their funding has been drastically reduced over recent years. Community composting

Following an informative and interesting visit to Ash Meadow, the Ashprington scheme, we concluded that the site previously considered for a community composting scheme in Blackawton is definitely too small to be viable. More discussions with our Playing Fields Committee may suggest a more suitable site, but this would require more funding to install "hard stand" for occasional vehicle access so that shredding, turning and moving of material is possible. Sorry to have no progress to report, these things always take longer than anticipated!

Community Energy

The Energy Local Club (ELC), recently set up by Totnes Renewable Energy Society (TRESOC), is soon to add hydro power to the locally generated solar power. The generators are paid, and the local consumers pay for, a unit electricity price which is beneficial to both.

Blackawton has little opportunity for hydro power but situated on a south facing slope there are buildings within the village with ample roof space for solar power generation, eg. recently built employment units, our primary school, St. Michaels church and many residential properties. Our village hall has benefited financially from the installation of solar pv roof panels in 2010 and would qualify as a generator for a new,

future energy local club in Blackawton. We also have extremely good wind resource above the village, though any suggestion of onshore wind turbines would need considerable support from the local community, and funding through many sources such as grants, private and public investment.

Sustainable Blackawton would like to see local debate and discussion about community energy, the views of local residents are crucial in any attempt to implement future possibilities, however far in the future that may be. It is also worth noting that South Hams District Council include in their report on achieving net zero they intend to "enable our communities to play their part in working towards net-zero. Community-led projects will be able to bid for funding to implement projects that will contribute to a net-zero South Hams; explore renewable energy opportunities across the District; deliver £300,000 funding for community projects; adopt an electric Vehicle Charging Strategy".

The committee employs two part-time staff, Helen & Kaede, to run the shop, but it's largely staffed by volunteers. In recent years we've made a small profit. Part of any profit may go into reserves – for historical reasons the shop has a reasonable reserve "cushion" – otherwise profits must be reinvested in the shop or put into community projects.

The Thoughts of Chairman Rake

A question of value

In a very mild way it seems that the Parish Council put a small cat amongst the hornets and stirred up the pigeons' nest last month by inviting your responses to a survey on possibly applying to register The George Inn as an Asset of Community Value. The volume of responses to the survey seems to have broken all recent records (in the good way; there have been lots) and whilst I can't claim to have been deluged with questions about this, I have had a few, so I thought it might be worth clarifying what is going on.

To begin at the beginning: the notions of Assets of Community Value and the Community Right to Bid were created by the 2011 Localism Act — one of many examples of the temptation to turn political slogans and catchphrases into law (the culprit in this case being 'the Big Society' — remember that?). The intention of the Act (Part 5 Chapter 3 if you're interested) was to "give communities the opportunity to take control of assets and facilities in their neighbourhoods". This was to be achieved by creating the right to bid for certain assets and allowing the time to prepare a bid. In other words, it provides communities with a sort of insurance policy against a cherished local asset being sold out from under them when, if they had had more time, they could have and would have made an offer to take ownership.

The process is relatively simple (bear with me): a community group (including but not limited to the Parish Council) can nominate assets to be included by the District Council on their list of community assets. The District Council then has eight weeks to decide whether to list the asset (for a period of five years) or reject the nomination. "Aha!" I hear those of you who are still awake saying, "but what happens then?" Good question, and well done for still being awake. The answer might be "nothing"; or it could be "quite a lot".

"Nothing" unless the now-listed asset is put up for sale. In other words, if the asset has not been put up for sale in the five years following its listing then the asset falls off the list, and the community can decide whether it wants to repeat the process. Oh, and just to be extra clear, we are talking here about sale of the freehold or of a lease of more than 25 years. "Quite a lot" if the asset is put up for sale within the five-year period. In this case a community group would have six weeks in which to express an interest in bidding for the asset; if it does, there is then a six-month moratorium period – during which the asset may not be sold – to give it time to prepare its offer. At the end of this period, the owner may sell the asset to whoever they choose, and at whatever price they choose. In other words, the community bid might not succeed. Oh, and just for added fun and games, there is nothing to stop two or more 'rival' community groups from bidding! Simple as that! When it comes to The George Inn, we are still at the stage of gathering evidence for an application for a listing. If there is, and it is approved, then the only thing that will change is that we will know that if The George Inn comes up for sale in the next five years, the community will have a chance to express an interest in bidding (6 weeks) and then make a bid (6 months). But to be clear, this is something that the Parish Council has been mulling for a while. It is not a response to any event or circumstance. The current survey is just seeking to establish if we should take out the "insurance policy".

Open Forum

DCC's Cutting of Vicarage Road Verges. A member of the public said that DCC has recently cut the grassy verges on Vicarage Road. They are willing to maintain the verges and DCC does not need to do so.

French Furze Update. Vistry has started to resolve drainage under the MUGA. It is currently responsible for the playground.

Present: Parish & South Hams District Cllr Rake (Chair), Parish Cllrs Oughton(Vice-Chair), Coe, Hadow, Mardon, and Thomas were present, as was Devon County Cllr Brazil (for his report), A Thom (Clerk), and two members of the public.

Report from South Hams District Council Councillor

Cllr Rake reported that at a local level SHDC is trying to fund the rebuilding of the Village Hall: just under £50,000 from French Furze s.106 funds. Meeting SHDC's requirement to show that value is being obtained is difficult due to the large amount of volunteer labour.

SHDC's Strategic Plan is out for consultation. It includes better located, designed, and priced affordable housing. Climate and biodiversity issues are the other main thing. The delivery plan will follow. The updated SHDC website goes live tomorrow. SHDC has acquired seven houses in Sherford under a government scheme for acute social housing need. The housing was under budget – SHDC bought eight and has bid for funding in next round. Waste containers have been distributed. There are 8,000 to distribute and they need to be out by end of this month.

Cllr Thomas asked about parking at the new Health and Wellbeing Centre. There is a part of the road adjacent to the eight free one hour slots which looks a space and the disabled bay is a distance from the meter. Cllr Thomas will describe the issues directly to the relevant SHDC Officer.

Report from Devon County Council Councillor

DCC is still struggling. It has a new Chief Executive. DCC is in consultation with SHDC about a council tax reduction for carers. The Special Education Needs debt will be £160 million by end of the financial year. The deadline to resolve the problem is March 2026. The debt will be bigger than the realisable assets. There is a Slapton Line meeting on 20 October, including the economic assessment consultancy's report. DCC will produce a new plan for planning permission. There will be some road closures: in Stoke Fleming in January, February, March, and in East Charleton for three weeks in November. The meeting asked about a nighttime closure of the A3122 near Dartmouth which will be looked into.

BPC considered its response to the legal advice received that BPC does not have legal responsibility for maintenance of the closed churchyard. It was resolved unanimously to endeavour to arrange a meeting with the PCC Chair to endeavour to regularise the current arrangements.

Phone Box Restoration

Cllr Thomas provided a verbal report. More information is needed about the options available. This will be an item on the next BPC Agenda.

Dead Ash Tree in Blackawton Cemetery

The proposal to retain the tree, remove its lowest branches, and grow plants up it, to support biodiversity, was considered. It was agreed that the Clerk would take advice on the safety of the proposal and in the interim Cllr Rake will remove the broader low branches with a hand-saw, with the Clerk.




