



Reader's corner from Jenny Harris

Trees are fascinating and their functions are many. They absorb carbon dioxide, along with other polluting gases, storing the carbon while re-oxygenating the air. They also help prevent soil erosion, help to slow water evaporation, and more. Many trees are mentioned in the Bible, useful for their wood (such as the cedars of Lebanon) and their fruits such as the pomegranate, fig, palm and olive. The olive is a wonderful tree and was important in biblical times; its oil was used for eating, cooking, anointing in worship and as a healing balm; its leaves have medicinal properties. The palm tree also gives much: fruit, wine from the sap; leaf stems used to make ropes and rigging; leaves used for many different articles and to provide shade; tall straight trunks valuable for their timber. It is known as the tree of life by desert people.

When you next go for a walk, find a tree and just sit or stand beneath it, observe the canopy of branches that seasonally burst with buds, leaves, flowers and fruit; just marvel at its beauty. Thank God for trees which add such richness to his creation. In the Bible whilst resting under a fig tree Nathanael was seen and chosen by Jesus. Little Zachaeus sat among the branches of a sycamore tree and saw Jesus, who called him to God's service.

Reflect on the following verses from the Book of Psalms.

Psalm 52, verse 3: But I am like an olive tree, thriving in the house of God. I will always trust in God's unfailing love.

Psalm 42, verse 12: But the godly will flourish like palm trees and grow strong like the cedars of Lebanon. Peace and joy be with you all.

It was good to see everyone who came to the community shop AGM. It's good to be able to report that the shop has held up well over the past year, despite inflation and the rising cost of living. Although turnover isn't doing more than keeping up with inflation, we're hanging on in there and indeed doing our best to keep on improving - supported by all our customers, our kind and wonderful band of volunteers and our ever-dynamic manager! Thank you to all of you!

As reported at the AGM, the vital nature of volunteers in keeping community shops alive has now been recognised by the tax authorities in monetary terms, via a precedent elsewhere. So we should now be able to take into account a value for volunteer hours in our tax returns; this should mean largely eliminating any corporation tax liability (unless we make implausibly large profits!) - so there will be more to reinvest in your shop and community. So we hope to continue to donate funds to local projects when they are needed, as we did last year.

We've also recently taken on an assistant manager; Kaede will help Helen out with the widening array of tasks needed for the shop to run successfully. Kaede is part of Redhill Market Garden, whose fantastic produce has been selling like hot cakes (or perhaps I should say – like fresh greens) all summer. Registration of The George Inn as an Asset of Community Value

The George Inn has a central place in the community of Blackawton. The Parish Council is proposing to make an application to register it with the District Council as an 'asset of community value'. We would like to know if there is support in the Parish for such an application.

If approved, registration would give the community more time (up to six months) to buy The George Inn if it came up for sale on the open market. The owner is not required to sell to a community group. (www.southhams.gov.uk/article/3851/Assets-of-Community-Value).

The District Council needs to know whether residents support the registration, what residents value in The George Inn, and whether there is a realistic possibility, if The George Inn were to come up for sale in future,

The Thoughts of Chairman Rake

You don't know what you've got 'til it's gone

As the autumn rains begin (did they ever stop?), it would take a stony heart not to feel sympathy for those affected by the flash floods in Libya. Extremely heavy rain caused two dams to collapse, releasing some 30 million cubic metres of water into already inundated areas of the city of Derna, destroying a quarter of the city and taking several thousand lives. In the aftermath, we have representative after representative of major NGOs bemoaning the fact that it has been hard to get aid to the affected areas because of the breakdown in Libya's 'civil society'. As a result the effects of the original disaster have been exacerbated, with food, shelter and medical treatment slow to reach the people that needed them.

Hearing this at first, I nodded sagely, taking it at face value. But then I got to thinking. What exactly is this civil society that has broken down? What is missing; how would things have been different if civil society had been strong and flourishing?

I think that answer is a big difference in a lot of small ways. For starters, the dams that failed would have been inspected and repaired. Downstream, the risk of dam failure might have been considered, with mitigation measures put in place against the possibility of catastrophic failure. Of course, none of this would have stopped the storm, but it might have given the dams a better chance of holding and reduced the damage even if they had failed. Bad things can still happen though, and then dozens of different factors would have come into play: a proper register of inhabitants (with the particularly vulnerable identified appropriately), properly maintained roads and teams of officials available to assist the aid efforts by drawing on their detailed local knowledge... the list goes on.

That's the thing about civil society: it consists of lots of small components often working unseen in the background. Taken together though, they have an essential role in ensuring the proper functioning of many aspects of everyday life as well as providing a basis from which things can be stepped up should an emergency arise.

We saw this during the pandemic, when the machinery of civil society creaked into action to provide testing, vaccination, support for vulnerable individuals and much more besides. I hesitated before using the word 'creaked' in that last sentence, but unfortunately I think it is appropriate. Obviously some parts of civil society, most notably the emergency services, are regularly 'stress tested' in the normal course of their activities, but other smaller components have to rely on self-assessed readiness and their own evaluations of risk. We know that many of the components – healthcare, roads, sewage – are under considerable strain even before emergency strikes. No wonder it creaked.

I realise that this is all rather gloomy; perhaps it is the persistent autumnal drizzle that has dampened my mood. The brief shaft of sunlight comes from the fact that our experience has also shown that when the chips are down our communities stand forward. In other words, the smallest components of all – the network of relationships between individuals – are often also the strongest and most resilient. If we are to protect and rebuild our civil society, and in so doing prevent emergency turning into disaster, I think these smallest parts of the fabric would be the right place to start.

Open Forum

Airband Community Liaison Officer. The Airband Community Liaison Officer attended to discuss the project. Airband is working for Connecting Devon and Somerset to install fibre broadband connections to outlying residences. Broadband speeds will be up to 900 Mbps. To access the connections residences will contract with Airband. Work is scheduled to start at the end of 2023 and to be completed autumn 2024. Airband will use existing infrastructure 70 to 80 percent of the time. It will be installing some new poles. The Officer said that Airband is preparing an updated map of the planned distribution sites. The Airband Officer said that to help the process residents can go on the Airband website, put in their postcode, and

register an interest. The Sales team will contact them at a later date. Expressing interest does not commit residents to using the service.

Public Open Forum. No matters raised.

Present: Parish Cllrs Oughton(Vice-Chair & meeting Chair), Coe, Hadow, and Thomas were present, as was Devon County Cllr Brazil (for his report), and A Thom (Clerk). There were no members of the public present.

Apologies

Apologies for absence were received from Parish & South Hams District Cllr Rake & BPC Cllr Mardon.

Declarations of Interest

Cllrs Coe and Oughton declared an Other Registerable Interest in the Village Hall planning application. Cllr Coe declared a disclosable pecuniary interest in The George Inn.

Report from South Hams District Council Councillor

Cllr Rake's written report was read. Apart from dealing with concerns raised by various residents across our ward, August was a quiet month, as is usual for the District Council. Work continues in the background, however, and the autumn should bring the beginning of a shift to a new set of policies for SHDC. In addition, we expect all households to finally come under the same waste collection regime. The systems are in place, but a last-minute hold up with the licensing of collection vehicles by DVLA means that the start date for the unified service is still not known. I think that a lot of lessons have been learned from the mistakes of the past few years, and I hope that the introduction of the service will be smoother than the last time it was attempted!

Report from Devon County Council Councillor

Devon County Cllr Brazil reported that the target date to provide all residents with the same collection service has been put back to February because of a DVLA issue with the new vehicles. After that SHDC can develop more bespoke solutions for local areas. Cllr Brazil attended a Children's Services meeting this morning, there are full Council and Cabinet meetings next week, and the revenue budget monitoring report is due. DCC's financial position is getting worse less quickly. If the Slapton Line needed to close the sandbank would remain. There is an economic impact assessment being done.

Consultations

- Devon Housing Commission, Short Survey. No response by BPC.
- A379 Slapton Line Economic Impact Assessment by SHDC. To consider requesting the inclusion of Blackawton. The Clerk was asked to contact the consultants to investigate further whether Blackawton should be included. If the Slapton Line needed to close Blackawton would be affected by a change in the volume of traffic and an increase in time taken to travel to some locations.
- Housing Needs Survey by SHDC in September 2023. The planned Survey was noted. There will be Community Drop-in sessions: 28 September, Blackawton Church 1.00pm-3.00pm & East Allington Village Hall 3.30pm-5.30 pm.

Avenue of Cherry Trees in the Churchyard Management Consultation

The options suggested in the 18 survey responses received were noted: 13 prefer felling all cherry trees at the same time and 13 a single species being planted. A proposals document will be prepared by BPC taking into account the survey responses, information about what trees will succeed in that site, Devon Wildlife Trust report (pending), and the Diocese's churchyard planting plan and guidance. The Clerk and Cllr Haddow will start to write the proposals document.

Registration of The George Inn with SHDC as an 'Asset of Community Value'

Cllr Thomas and the Clerk will prepare the community consultation to seek evidence of support for the registration and that if it was to come up for sale in the future the asset could continue to be run by the community to further the social wellbeing or social interests of the local community. A petition, web-form, and Beacon article were proposed.

"20's Plenty" Campaign

It was resolved to write to notify DCC that BPC has voted to support the 20's Plenty for Devon Campaign.

'Blackawton' Sign

The small metal sign will be installed on the horizontal front beam of the Normandy Cross bus shelter using tamper proof screws.

Yew Tree in the Churchyard

Cllr Coe will lead on work to fertilise and clear the yew tree in the cemetery, which is not thriving.

Order of Use, Marking, and Layout of Lawn Cemetery Grave Plots

It was agreed that the additional five grave plot locations identified in the sections G and H of the lawn cemetery would be used and that the next area will be marked using eight foot by four foot plots. Netting pegs are being trialled to mark out the plots' locations.

Cemetery Temporary Soil Storage Area Marker Posts

It was confirmed that the Maintenance Contractor will be asked to install the posts.

Repair of the Churchyard Gates

The project to repair and maintain the four churchyard gates was discussed. The report about the work required will be sent to the PCC. It was suggested to confirm whether the lychgate needs to be fixed in place. BPC has received legal advice that BPC has no legal responsibility for the maintenance of the churchyard. Starting the gates project was deferred until the PCC has decided how it will proceed.

Cemetery Charges Review

It was resolved to agree a project to review the schedule of charges.


